Scene 4 – Stopwatch or wristwatch with stopwatch function

Scene 5 – Two soup bowls, two soup spoons (though it might be subtly funnier if they're some other sort of spoon), newspaper, MP3 player

Scene 6 - Wristwatch

Scene 7 – Dirty crockery and cutlery, long sheet of paper, pocket calculator, 50p piece
